**The In Between Time
“What’s Your Spiritual
Type?”**

In her book, *Discover Your Spiritual Type: A Guide to Individual and Congregational Growth* (Alban Institute, 1995), Corinne Ware offers a framework for individuals and groups to name and understand their spiritual experience and preferences. Ware identifies four basic types of spiritual experience:

Head Spirituality: A person of this spirituality type is most comfortable learning through the written or spoken word and grappling with content. They tend to like serious Bible study, good sermons, and theological discussion. They want to be challenged and to learn something during worship.

Heart Spirituality: A person of this spirituality type values depth of feeling and seeks to experience God in the moment. This person often finds God through in depth relationships with other people and in small groups. They want to be moved by the music, prayers, or the sermon during worship.

Mystic Spirituality: A person of this spirituality type desires to engage in a deep sort of knowing and is more likely to listen for God than to speak to God. They find contemplative prayer, nature, and reflective Scripture study to be places where they meet God. They want to experience the mysterious, transcendent God during worship and especially appreciate the Lord’s Supper and silence.

Kingdom Spirituality: A person of this spirituality type is an active visionary with a faith that transforms persons and society. They tend to be involved in social justice causes and experience God most clearly when they are doing God’s work in the world. They want to experience God’s motivating power and justice during worship and find a word that will equip them for the week ahead.

Do any of these types resonate with you more than others? Or do you find yourself fitting several of them or perhaps you are drawn to all depending upon your life circumstances? You may be able to think of one or more people at First Parish who reflect each type. You may also recognize that FPC has a dominant “way of being faithful” that leans toward one or more of these characterizations. Sometimes that shifts back and forth over time.

Does it matter what “type” of person or church you are? No. And yes! No, spirituality type doesn’t matter because God calls all kinds of people to follow as disciples and to participate in God’s reign.

But spirituality type does matter in that each type comes with its comforts and challenges. Knowing something about yourself and your church can make it easier to understand why we are drawn to certain areas of church life, and why we might find other areas to be anxiety-producing. Understanding more about

our spiritual “style” and preferences can help us to understand our ministry hopes, expectations, and priorities and make wise choices about the ways we contribute to life in the body of Christ.

If we recognize that we are each created uniquely, it makes sense that we have different ways we express our spirituality and experience the Holy. Some prefer group prayer while others prefer small group or private prayer. Some want “hands on” projects that make a difference in the here and now while others want to look deeply into the mystery of life and always see beyond the present. All are legitimate approaches to the life of faith.

Thinking programmatically, some spirituality types will prefer weighty study groups, some social ministry projects, some a support group, and others a series on Christian meditation. Offering a diversity of program and worship opportunities serves the variety of personalities present in the congregation.

First Corinthians 12 reminds us of the importance of both the individuality and the unity we share as members of the body of Christ. By acknowledging and affirming our differences and living out an active spirituality, we gain a glimpse of that “still more excellent way”—God’s love that binds us all in community.

Deacon's Bench

Change represents a challenge to all of us. During this time of transition, our church is not immune to serious impediments to moving forward. Conflicts, both old and new have surfaced in our midst, along with frustration, hurt, and anger that many feel present a clear picture of a church in crisis.

Since we are a Christian community, many feel that we shouldn’t have conflicts, but, in fact, we do. Since we are a Christian community, many feel that we should automatically have the skills to deal with conflict effectively, but, in fact, we do not.

Your board of deacons is planning a series of events and professional training this fall to strengthen and renew our church. The purpose of this program is to help us to help ourselves. The deacons have strongly endorsed the work of Nancy Brown and Rev Dr William Brown, husband and wife who team together as NPB & Associates of Hopkinton, NH. The Browns have met with both the Diaconate and the Council and come highly recommended as a team that can assist our church.

The first phase of the work will involve training our church leaders to manage change, help our members and friends develop a stronger sense of belonging, improve communication, problem solve, and transform conflict into growth.

The second phase will invite all church members to participate in a session that will share the characteristics of a healthy congregation, focus on the dynamics of belonging, increase understanding of conflict and healthy approaches to resolution, and develop covenants around being in community. All of this work is designed to “equip the saints” for spiritual lives in which we all share a vitality and passion for our mission of living the gospel.

The Brown’s will serve as facilitators for these sessions and will use their expertise and experience to guide our work, but ultimately, the work to move us closer to a dynamic community of faith will be ours to do. As with all worthwhile endeavors, this project has costs in both human capital and in dollars and cents. The expenses are not part of our annual budget and thus, must be raised separately.

The Diaconate and Council have agreed upon a fund raising plan to address this expense. Your participation in fund raising efforts is needed and a congregational letter will be sent soon with details. We ask to please be prepared to respond affirmatively. Please continue to keep our beloved church and our leaders in your prayers.

Stewardship Moment

“WHAZZUUP?”

Ah yes, the famous greeting coined several years ago by one of the TV advertising campaigns. It seems like an appropriate beginning for this month’s Stewardship article. Or perhaps “Ramblings and Rantings” is more appropriate.

- The Stewardship Committee is busy developing a “Narrative Budget” format for use in the fall campaign. It is intended to be a more user friendly way of understanding of how the money is raised and spent at FPC. This may be helpful for those of us who are not comfortable with or have difficulty understanding the traditional accounting spreadsheet format. And we hope that it will give more “life” to the way we show our activities at FPC.
- We’re expecting that this year’s Stewardship Campaign will incorporate additional, user friendly choices for giving to FPC. Included would be options to utilize Electronic Fund Transfers from a bank account (presumably one of your own), credit and debit cards, or Online Internet donations using FPC’s Web Site.
- Recently Kathy Daniels asked for brief “job descriptions” that could be utilized by the Nominating Committee as they seek out volunteers to serve on FPC’s various committees and boards. While preparing a list of the Stewardship Committees’ primary responsibilities, I thought of the personality traits necessary to say “Yes” when asked to serve. My initial thoughts included:
 1. At an early age, wanted to be a tax or bill collector instead of a highly regarded health care worker, educator, or athlete.
 2. Enjoys being a “pain in the neck”. Role models include telephone solicitors and TV infomercial producers (It chops, shreds, dices and even goes to church regularly!).

3. Immune from being shunned by others, particularly during annual pledge campaign season.

Eventually rational thought prevailed. Important characteristic for service on the committee include:

1. Strong commitment to the Mission and Values of FPC.
2. Understand that a key element of the Christian faith is meaningful sharing of our time and talents (Walk the walk, vs. talk the talk).
3. Being willing to move beyond our own personal “comfort zone” while engaged in fund raising activities at FPC.

Like the Marine’s, “we can use a few good men and women”. Will you answer the call?

Transition Team Happenings

The Transition Team's work is guided by the Alban Institute's *Temporary Shepherds: A Congregational Handbook for Interim Ministry* (Roger Nicholson, Ed., 1998). *Temporary Shepherds* lifts up the blessings of sharing the 'interim discoveries and the fruits of genuine collegiality that serve as support and affirmation.' Nicholson notes that interim ministry has evolved over the past two decades, as clergy and laity have learned what it means for a congregation to be between installed pastors.

As a congregation, we have an important and exciting task: to prepare the way for our next settled pastor. The Transition Team is planning two opportunities for your continued contribution to this process. In the next few months, you will be invited to "Cottage Meetings", which will be held in parishioners' homes. The purpose of the meetings is to gather information about our congregation's strengths, hopes, and wishes for our future. The Transition Team will gather this data in a form that can be integrated into our strategic plan. You will also be invited to complete a Pastoral Search Inventory. We are pleased that this form is now available in an online format, which will save us considerable time and expense. We will also make sure that those who are unable to complete the electronic form are provided with someone who can be a "computer helper" or receive a paper copy.

"Bewildered though we may be by the way things are changing, we are not without faith that God is re-shaping the church in ways we cannot yet see. A new form of the local church may already be emerging out of the yet powerful and creative bodies of Christ's people as we know today.

It is our faith that the church is God's creation, and what God means it to be in the future will be made plain. Speaking through the prophet Isaiah, God says, 'Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?' (Isa. 43:19, RSV)" (*Temporary Shepherds*, p. xi)

Please join us in these steps along the way – together, and with God's blessings, all things are possible!


