The In Between Time “Understanding the Intergenerational Church”

In many churches today conflicts erupt around worship styles, financial priorities, and the nature of mission. It often divides along generational lines. Dr. Gary L. McIntosh of Talbot Theological School describes three different camps in this struggle. There are the “Builders,” those whose formative years were the 1920s, ‘30s, and ‘40s. Then there are the “Baby Boomers” born between 1946 and 1960 and last there are the “Baby Busters” or “Generation X’ers” who run from third grade to their mid-20s.

Dr. McIntosh observes three distinct sets of religious needs and expectations on how these find satisfaction in meaningful worship experiences for each generation. For the Builders, he observes, commitment to Christ means commitment to the church. People in that generation tends to be more program-oriented, give money to mission organizations, want Bible study led by the pastor, are loyal to the institution, and minister out of a sense of duty which often finds expression by serving on committees.

For Baby Boomers, commitment to Christ equals commitment to relationships. They tend to want ministry that is more people-oriented

prefer to give money to people rather than organizations, favor “hands on” missions in their own communities rather than go overseas, want practical Bible study and prayer-share groups, are loyal to people, and minister more for personal satisfaction.

For Gen X’ers commitment to Christ equals commitment to the community. This social group tends to be community-oriented, gives money to causes, and wants issue-oriented Bible study and prayer/share groups. They are loyal to causes, and minister to confront issues.

While these tendencies do not describe everyone in these age groups, they do give us a fair reading on some of the major differences in the religious “style” of the generations. In worship, those born before 1940 tend to like and expect quietness in church, love to sing the old hymns, want expository sermons, prefer more formal prayers said by the pastor, like the organ and/or piano, and are used to low audience participation. Friendliness is a very important value as well.

Baby Boomers prefer a more informal service with talking and socializing before worship. While they like to sing hymns they sometimes find them archaic in language, imagery and concern. They also enjoy both upbeat and worshipful choruses or praise songs that are accompanied by guitars, keyboard, and drums. Boomers want to hear practical, “how to” sermons, enjoy hearing various people pray, like higher congregational participation, and value anonymity when new. They want a religious experience when they come to church, not just an aesthetic one.

Baby Busters also enjoy informal worship with talking and praise songs. They would also like to add a jazz ensemble or other “non-traditional” instruments. They too prefer to remain anonymous and hear various people pray and lead the service. Where they are different from the other two groups is that they prefer “issue-oriented” sermons and want

less audience participation. Gen X'ers (and now Gen Y'ers) are skeptical and don't want to believe because they were taught a certain way or because their parents believed that way. They want an experience with God first hand in worship.

So what do we do with this information? First of all, each generation needs to realize that the other is not just being stubborn about change or that they don't appreciate tradition. Rather, each generation is shaped by cultural and political events and sets of values, which uniquely inform them. Builders lived through the Depression and World War II whereas Baby Boomers were shaped by Vietnam, the civil rights movement, and a growing economy. Today Gen X'ers live with a variable economy and can't count on a job after graduation from college. Their first political memory is the taking of hostages in Iran and the Persian Gulf War. 9/11 was today's generation's first memory.

Older members had a higher birth rate, have a high view of marriage and a low divorce rate. Boomers marry later; have a low birth rate, and a low view of marriage with a high divorce rate. For Busters, the pendulum is swinging back more to the center. While we can't jump out of our generational skins, at least we can try to understand and appreciate where the other is coming from.

Second, our identity in Christ, not our common tastes, unites us. New Testament churches were made up of people of different ages, genders, races, and socio-economic levels who came together because of their common faith in Christ. Christ gave them their identity and, consequently, their unity. In an era of marketing niches – of builders, boomers, and busters – we have grown accustomed to having things our way. But do we really need single taste congregations? What would happen if people with different musical tastes and preferences in worship got along because of their common commitment to Christ?

Third, we need each other. The younger generation needs the memory and wisdom of the older generation. We need to celebrate the strength of our best traditions and let others go

that have outlived their usefulness or no longer carry the same meaning. The older generation needs the vitality and energy of the new generation. They need to graciously yield positions of authority and ways of doing things to the next generation. Let them make the same mistakes you did. The younger generation needs to appreciate that a certain predictability gives other folks a level of comfort and security when they are experiencing loss or change in every other area of their lives.

I remember standing on a bluff in Harper's Ferry, VA, overlooking where the Potomac and Shenandoah Rivers joined. There was a lot of turbulence where those two mighty rivers met. But downstream, it smoothed out again and flowed in peace. The same thing is happening in our churches today. A number of streams are coming together causing turbulence and unrest. Increasingly, new members to our church are from non-Congregational back-grounds and have young families.


We are becoming more like a community church with a diversity of tastes, experiences, and expectation of the church and the minister. The model of ministry that worked in the 60s and 70s no longer works in the early 21st century. Pastors need to be more missionary minded and entrepreneurial than their predecessors. We are increasingly living in a post-Christian culture and people are not inclined to come to church. I have a friend who turned around a church that was almost dead in Revere, MA. "Business as usual, done well," he says, "will no longer work." Churches need to be innovative and flexible to meet the demands of a new century even as they cherish the best of the past.

On Sunday, September 19, after worship in the parlor, I invite you all to attend an Adult Education Forum where I will explore these themes more deeply so that we can better understand and appreciate one another and think about practical ways to be a church for every generation.

Safer Spaces Committee

First Parish is committed to creating and maintaining a worship and fellowship community where all members, friends, staff, and volunteers may share their spiritual journey together in an atmosphere that minimizes the potential for physical injury/harm and is free from all forms of discrimination, harassment, exploitation, or intimidation. To this end the Safer Spaces Committee was established and is charged with the oversight of all matters relating to these areas of concern.

The Committee has worked with the FPC Council to develop related policy statements and procedures. A FPC Safer Spaces Handbook has been developed and copies are located in the Church Office, Senior Minister and Associate Minister Offices, Christian Education and Youth Group Office, and with appropriate committee chairs. The policies and procedures included in this handbook apply to all activities which take place within the building and properties of First Parish Church, as well as program, activities, or events scheduled as part of the ministry of this church which take place elsewhere. The policies and procedures apply to all members, friends, volunteers, or employees of the church.

All individuals who work with children and youth in church-related activities must complete a background check and reference form. The Safer Spaces Committee and the FPC Christian Education Board work together to conduct this process. In addition, training is required for all individuals who will work with children/youth. A schedule of training sessions for the coming year will be announced shortly.





More Adult Education Opportunities



Several exciting opportunities for deepening your faith and building community with fellow travelers will once again be available this fall. Revs. Bendroth and McArdle will be leading a reading/discussion book ***An Altar in the World: A Geography of Faith*** by Barbara Brown Taylor.

Taylor calls her book a field guide to spiritual practices: “My life depends on ignoring all touted distinctions between the secular and the sacred, the physical and the spiritual, the body and the soul. What is saving my life now is becoming more fully human, trusting that there is no way to God, apart from real life in the real world.”

Taylor is an Episcopal priest, professor of religion at [Piedmont College](#), Demorest, Ga., and also teaches spirituality at [Columbia Theological Seminary](#), Decatur, Ga.

She presents formal and informal spiritual practices that will help deepen our humanity and broaden our connection with others. Along the way, she shares many colorful vignettes and ponders the experiences of some well-known biblical characters. In addition to keeping the Sabbath, walking meditation and prayer, she covers blessings, living with purpose and encountering others in community.

The study will begin on Monday, September 20 at 7 pm in the parlor. You can order a copy from Amazon.com or sign up on the bulletin board in the atrium and we'll order them in bulk at \$10.20 each.

Sunday Morning Adult Study

While the children are in Sunday school, adults meet with Rev. Bendroth in their own classroom for study and discussion. Last year we studied the Book of Acts; this fall we are beginning a series on *Characters of the Bible*. What do Abraham, David, Ruth, and Priscilla have to say to us today as we try to live the Gospel in our generation? We will also be taking a vote as we move forward to see what other topics we might like to explore. Don't just drop your child off for church school or come to church at the last minute, feed your own soul and make some new friends!

Understanding the Intergenerational Congregation~ Ever wonder why grown-ups talk past each other when discussing money, mission or worship? It's often because of generational differences.
